COMBATTING HEART DISEASE IN WOMEN

On April 29, 1992, the Los Angelos Riots began in response to the acquittal of four white police officers involved in the brutal beating of African American man, Rodney King. The riots resulted in at least 50 deaths, thousands of citizens injured, and an estimated \$1,000,000,000 in property damage.
